## MLR Reclamation Awards Selection Criteria

AWARD	CRITERIA
Outstanding Operator	This award recognizes operations which have done an excellent job of mine development and/or operations on a daily basis. Outstanding operations can lead to outstanding reclamation.
	<ul> <li>Attention to detail and maintenance of on-site controls to prevent or minimize degradation of water quality.</li> <li>No significant enforcement actions within the last ten years.</li> </ul>
	• Going beyond the requirement of rule such as wider setbacks than required, over-designed facilities to reduce potential impacts, e.g. sediment ponds, enhanced visual screens, or buffer strips to protect stream drainages or habitat.
	• Leading the way by using innovative techniques that improve the quality of operation and enhance environmental protection.
	Operating in a manner that reduces reclamation liability by completing concurrent reclamation on sand and gravel or industrial mineral sites or by maintaining benching on quarry highwalls.
Outstanding Reclamation	This award recognizes operations which go beyond minimum requirements and/or have a creative approach to reclamation. Minimum standards for reclamation require leaving a non-eroding landform with a stable vegetative cover. To a certain degree, reclamation
	requirements are site specific. Outstanding reclamation sites may also go beyond requirements of the DOGAMI approved reclamation plan for that site.
	<ul> <li>Examples of outstanding efforts which could be considered are:</li> <li>irregular shorelines and islands for wildlife habitat vs. standard slope and revegetation</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>enhanced habitat and/or species diversity over what existed prior to mining, e.g., creation of wetlands, fisheries enhancement, etc.</li> <li>reclamation blends in with surrounding landforms, i.e., aesthetically pleasing</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>voluntary reclamation on exempt land</li> <li>backfilling the mine area other than where it is required to protect groundwater quality</li> <li>development of public access and recreation opportunities through reclamation</li> </ul>
	• collection and use of native species Other considerations:
	<ul> <li>degree of difficulty and cost of the reclamation.</li> <li>use of new or innovative approaches that improve quality of reclamation and/or have industry-wide applications.</li> </ul>
Outstanding Reclamation Planning	This award is for operators who, prior to receiving a permit or amendment, submit detailed innovative or creative integrated reclamation plans that are consistent with, but exceed minimum standards for reclamation habitat, i.e. construction or creation. A nominated reclamation plan must be compatible with local zoning and may also provide a greater degree
Outstanding	of environmental protection of adjacent natural resources than what is required by statute. DOGAMI would like to recognize a "Reclamationist of the year", an individual responsible
Reclamationist (From Within the Industry)	for mine reclamation from planning to implementation to equipment operation, who provides an enthusiasm and creativity, producing superior reclamation.
Oregon Plan	This award recognizes an operator who voluntarily creates or enhances salmonid habitat within a permitted area, or who volunteers equipment for off site use.
Small Operator	Same as for large operator, just on a smaller scale. Award may either recognize outstanding reclamation or operator.
Good Neighbor	Unselfishly working with neighbors and the community in a spirit of cooperation to reflect a positive image of the mining industry. Development of cooperative projects which benefit the environment and the community.
Exploration	This award is for operators who do a commendable job of reclaiming exploration roads and drill pads to the pre-mine topography and revegetating the site to blend in with the surrounding vegetation, and following established drill hole abandonment procedures for ground water protection.
Agency	This award is separate because reclamation is often underwritten as part of an associated highway construction project. All government sites are exempt from bonding requirements.
Voluntary Reclamation	This award recognizes those operators who perform reclamation on lands that have been deemed exempt from the reclamation law.
